NORTH COUNTRY CHORUS AND ST. JOHNSBURY ACADEMY STUDENTS PRESENT MOZART AND MORE

The North Country Chorus under the direction of Alan Rowe will present its spring program at three venues in early May. The concert will be a collaborative one as Alan's Hilltones, a select group of Saint Johnsbury Academy students, will be an integral part of the mix. The groups will combine to sing Mozart's "Regina Coeli" with string accompaniment. After intermission the Hilltones will do an eclectic set of pieces of their own prior to joining North Country Chorus for several final short works.

In the first half of the program NCC also will perform Mozart's "Vesperae Solennes de Confessore" K 339. The Vespers, composed in 1780, is a joyous collection of six movements, including five Psalms and a setting of the Magnificat. It will have orchestra accompaniment and a quartet of solo voices from the region. Soprano Julie Drown and baritone Bob Mead are longtime members of the chorus. Alto Susanne Norwood of East Burke and tenor Andrew Lidestri of Lyman will round out the quartet.

Performances will take place at South Congregational Church, St. Johnsbury, at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, May 2; Wells River Congregational Church at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 3; and Peacham Congregational Church at 3 p.m. on Sunday, May 4.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH IN BURLINGTON CELEBRATES ITS HOOK ORGAN'S SESQUICENTENNIAL

First Baptist Church of Burlington, Vermont is celebrating the sesquicentennial of its pipe organ, built by E.& G.G. Hook of Boston in 1864 and installed, as opus 342, in the church in October of that year. This instrument is the only unchanged nineteenth-century organ in Burlington.

There will be three recitals in 2014, on the first Sundays of June, September, and November. Admission is by donation. For more information contact the church office at (802) 864-6515 or visit the First Baptist Church website.

On June 1, at 4 p.m., Lynnette Combs, present organist, will give a program inspired by the programs of Alexandre Guilmant, the French superstar, who played 40 consecutive recitals, by memory, without repeating a piece, at the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904.

On September 7, George Matthew, Jr., former organist at First Baptist Church, will play; on November 2, Susan Summerfield, professor at St. Michael's College in Colchester and also a former organist at First Baptist, will perform.

E. & G.G. Hook was the most important nineteenth-century organbuilding firm in New England. It was a business from 1829-1936. The instrument at First Baptist is one of the most important historical organs in the state. Although moved within the building, it remains tonally unaltered. According to the Free Press article that reported on the inaugural concert, "The universal verdict was that the organ is a superior one, of unusual power for its size."

ESTEY ORGAN MUSEUM PRESENTS AN ESTEY ORGAN TOUR

The Estey Organ Museum will host a Tour of Estey Organs in Brattleboro, Vermont on Saturday, May 17, beginning at 1:00 p.m. The tour will begin at the First United Methodist Church (home of Estey Opus 1 from 1901) on Putney Road and conclude at the Museum, 108 Birge Street. Eight pipe organs will be visited, most of which are in playing condition. The event will include brief demonstration

programs on most of the organs. Participants will receive handout sheets describing each instrument and its history. Refreshments will be served at the Museum, and visitors will see and hear the Estey "walk-through" pipe organ as well as other reed organs on display. WHY MONTREAL?

Montreal is a vibrant cultural and musical and religious center with a long, rich history of the organ and sacred music in particular. In 2009, Montreal was named North America's number one host city for international association events, according to the 2009 preliminary rankings of the International Congress and Convention Organization. Montreal was referred to as "Canada's Cultural Capital" by Monocle magazine.

Nicknamed <u>la ville aux cent clochers</u> (the city of a hundred steeples), Montreal is renowned for its churches. Indeed, as Mark Twain once noted, "This is the first time I was ever in a city where you couldn't throw a brick without breaking a church window." The Oratory is the largest church in Canada, with the second largest copper dome in the world after that of Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome.

A combined Regional convention with RCCO (Royal Canadian College of Organists) and CIOC (Canadian International Organ Competition) would be a repeat of a very successful combined event - The International Congress of the Organ which took place in July 1993. The Convention would take place entirely in and around Montreal.

RCCO and CIOC plan a convention in Montreal with or without the AGO, though they would very much like to have us because it will multiply the possibilities and offerings. 2017 will be the 350th Jubilee of Montreal, the 150th Anniversary of Canada, and there is also a big Jazz Festival that year. To this date no chapter in the Northeast Region has been willing to apply to host a convention for 2017.

Tom Leslie, CIOC Exec Director and Region 2 Coordinator would be the Canadian Convention Chair. Tom has proven his capabilities by building CIOC up from scratch as it's Executive Director in a very short time (6 years). Our Regional Councillor, Cheryl Duerr has approached the Vermont chapter as the AGO co-host of this event. The primary responsibilities of the Vermont host would be 1) to run our Quimby Competition, 2) register the AGO members for the convention, 3) manage the AGO portion of the hotel contract, 4) collaborate on programming, 5) be responsible for an appropriate amount of Gifts and Grants. All of the logistical work will be done by RCCO in Montreal. Conference Direct has already done a report on potential hotels and will help with negotiations. The Montreal department of tourism would host 2 people on a site visit if the convention is approved by an AGO host.

This is a wonderful opportunity to build bridges between Vermont and Canada, especially Montreal. Distance does not have to be an issue in the planning. These days, many members of Convention Committees take part via WebEx or Free Conference Call. Please help us build a wonderful convention opportunity for our colleagues and say YES to Montreal 2017.
