On Wednesday, May 6 the first concert of Stowe's Noon Music in May series will feature an organ program by John Weaver. The event is about an hour long, free to everyone, and all are invited.

On Sunday, May 17 starting at 3:00 p.m. there will be a members' progressive recital in St. Albans. Churches to be featured are: Congregational, St. Paul's United Methodist, St. Luke's Episcopal, and St. Mary's/Immaculate Conception R. C. Church. Do plan on attending. Sunday, May 24 at 4:00 p.m. the next organ recital on the Ives Concert Series at the Church of Christ at Dartmouth College, 40 College Street, Hanover will feature young Benjamin Sheen, currently the Assistant Organist at St. Thomas Church in New York. Ben recently received his Master of Music degree from Julliard. He graduated with First Class Honours from Oxford, and was the Organ Scholar at Christ Church Cathedral there. He's an exciting young talent. These concerts are free, and everyone is welcome.

On Tuesday, May 26 at 12:15 p.m. Dr. William Tortolano will present Music in a Great Space: Annual Organ Recital at the St. Michael's College Chapel. The program will feature music from the film score: Richard II, William Walton; Three Organ Preludes on Jewish Modes, Reuven Kosakoff; two George Shearing spiritual settings; Ave Maria, Marcel Dupre (Rosemary Rogers, soprano); Sonata per Organo, Vincenzo Bellini (very operatic, perhaps its first US performance). Free and open to the public.

The Jewish Community Center in Stowe will present a concert of Jewish Cantorial Music and Gregorian Chant at the Stowe Community Church on Tuesday, June 9 at 12:00 noon. The Vermont Gregorian Chant Schola, Dr. William Tortolano, Director, sings "Missa de Angelic" and Jewish liturgical rounds. Rabbi Jan Salzman of Obavi Zedek Synagogue will sing and also encourage the audience to join her in singing some folk music. There will be an optional free will offering.

Artist-of-the-Year Jim Cassarino will present an organ recital on Sunday, June 14 at Trinity Church in Rutland, Vermont at 3:00 p.m. He will direct a program of festive music that will include music for organ, choir, brass, and woodwinds. Assisting artists will include colleagues whom he has collaborated with throughout the years. The Annual Meeting of the Vermont Chapter AGO is to follow at 4:15 p.m.

NORTH COUNTRY CHORUS PRESENTS "CARMINA BURANA"

North Country Chorus welcomes St. Johnsbury Academy Hilltones and St. Johnsbury School Chorus as collaborators in its annual Spring Concert. The program features <u>Carmina Burana</u> by Carl Orff, and will be performed in three venues: on Friday, May 1 at 7:30 p.m. at First Congregational Church, Littleton, NH; on Saturday, May 2 at 7:30 p.m. at Bradford Congregational Church, Bradford, VT; and on Sunday, May 3 at 3:00 p.m., at South Congregational Church, St. Johnsbury, VT.

Julie Drown, a favorite of North Country audiences, will sing the soprano solos. Other featured soloists will be baritone Gary Moreau and tenor Phil Brown. Accompaniment for <u>Carmina Burana</u> will be provided by pianists Vivian Spates and Mark Violette, as well as percussionists Rick Erwin, Ben Longo, Rory Donnelly, and Kaci Cochran, and flutists Jeffrey Fullerton and Libby Hillhouse. The entire ensemble will perform under the leadership of NCC Musical Director Alan Rowe.

Carmina Burana is characterized by its rhythmic energy and has been popular with audiences since its first performance in 1936. The text comes from a large collection of secular poems of the 12th and 13th centuries preserved at the Bavarian monastery of Benediktbeuren. The poems cover a wide range of human experience: the fickleness of luck and wealth, the joy of the return of spring, and the pleasures and perils of drinking, gluttony, gambling, and lust.

Several other short works will be performed by the St. Johnsbury School Chorus, under the direction of Nicole Bradford, and by the Academy's Hilltones, directed by Alan Rowe.

Tickets are available in advance from Catamount Arts (catamountarts.org), which has reduced its service fees: adults \$11, students \$5.50 (including fees). Admission at the door will be adults \$12, students \$5.
