# NORTH COUNTRY CHORUS PRESENTS MESSIAH IN CONCERT

For many music lovers the Christmas season is not complete without attending a performance of George Frideric Handel's Messiah. Upper Valley audiences will have three opportunities to hear this beloved oratorio performed by the North Country Chorus in early December. The group's 67th Annual Christmas Concert will feature prominent vocal and instrumental soloists from the region. This will be NCC's first Messiah performance since 2010. Alan Rowe, director of the Chorus since 1999, will lead the 80 choristers, soloists and instrumentalists.

Performances will take place on Friday, December 5, at 7:30 p.m. at First Congregational Church, Littleton, NH; on Saturday, December 6, at 7:30 p.m. at Wells River (VT) Congregational Church; and Sunday afternoon, December 7, at 2:30 p.m. at North Congregational Church, St. Johnsbury, VT.

The quartet of vocal soloists will consist of North Country favorites: soprano Julie Drown, alto Maria Weber Lamson, Tenor Phil Brown, and bass Gary Moreau.

Accompanying the group will be a corps of string performers led by Larry Blaine. Blaine, a professor of mathematics at Plymouth State University and freelance violinist, studied with Mischa Mischakoff and Romeo Tata and has performed in many concerts with the Chorus, including three seasons of Messiah. Other string players include Jan Sparks, Chris Nourse, Doug Kendall, and Nick Johnson. Additional accompaniment will be provided by Bruce Stevens on harpsichord, David H Heintz and Martin Gilmartin on trumpet, and Matt Nolan on timpani.

Admission at the door will be \$12 (\$5 for students).

# FROM HEADQUARTERS

AMERICAN GUILD OF ORGANISTS AWARDS SIX SCHOLARSHIPS TOTALING \$60,000 FOR COLLEGIATE ORGAN STUDY

This is the largest bequest in the history of the AGO and funds six Pogorzelski and Yankee organ Scholarships in 2014.

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) has awarded four scholarships for undergraduate organ study and two scholarships for graduate organ study to six college organ students enrolled in the 2014-2015 academic year. The six scholars were selected from an application pool of more than 50 students and received the awards based upon their demonstrated ability in organ playing and financial need.

Funded through a generous bequest from the estate of Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee, each undergraduate scholarship carries a cash award of \$7,500 and is renewable for up to four years of collegiate study. Each graduate scholarship carries a cash award of \$15,000 and is renewable for a total of two years of study. The 2014-2015 Scholarship Award recipients are:

Speaking on behalf of Messrs. Pogorzelski and Yankee, Dale J. Marsico Noted, "According to my uncles, the heart is reached easier through the use of organ music than any other musical form. Their music collection, music room, pipe organ, and Ron's playing ability were testimony to their love of the instrument. Their gift is a testament to their hopes that future generations might come to enjoy—to love and appreciate organ music as they did. They felt that their bequest to the American Guild of Organists offered the best opportunity for that possibility.

Two new Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Memorial Scholarships will be awarded for the 2015-2016 academic year-one for an incoming freshman (\$7,500), the other for a first-year graduate organ student (\$15,000). Eligibility requirements and application details are available online at Agohq.org/education. The online application period will run from January 1 through February 15, 2015.
